What's Gone on between Then and Now

Writers' Groups News – Contributed by Betty Prange (edited)

In a tradition that began over 13 years ago, writers got together in late January to share writing exercises and writing experiences. It was at a Boomerang (gathering of the Boomers BOF) in November of 1994 that Alice Zyetz first introduced some of us to the "let it all out" writing practices of Natalie Goldberg, author of Writing Down the Bones. Ever since when Boomers or Penwheelers meet, it is fun to share that experience.

These sessions include members of the Penwheel BOF but anyone with an interest in writing is welcome. We have had people who have published books, articles, short stories and poems, people who have had their plays or melodramas performed, people who would like to be published, and a good number of people who write simply for the joy of writing, for themselves or perhaps family and friends. Family histories, memoirs, haiku, mysteries, humor, historical fiction, science fiction, travel, how-to, and non-fiction are all represented by the people who attend.

In late January of 2008, during the Boomerang at Quartzsite, people joined together for two such sessions. In the first one, seven people met in Darlene Miller's motorhome to talk and write. Darlene and Sam Penny shared their experiences with self-publishing. Sam shared the plot of his books and Darlene announced she was having book signings at the bookstore in Quartzsite. Ardith Rehfeld shared a few of the haiku she has written. Other people in attendance were Debra Lind, Gretchen Chalsma, Verna Baker, and Betty Prange.

After those discussions we had a couple of writing practices; "Impressions of Quartzsite" and thinking of an odour (sweet, pungent, yeasty, sour, repulsive, whatever) write memories associated with it. Barnyard smells, creosote, and grass all conjured up memories for individuals.

Several days later Debra, Verna and Betty met in Betty's motorhome and wrote again. This time there were three topics. The first was based on a quote from Nobel peace prize winner; our second assignment consisted of drawing a card from the Balderdash game and using 4 words none of us had ever heard of before, weaving them into a little fantasy; our final section brought more serious and emotional responses. We each wrote a list of memories. Then each of us picked the memory from our own list which we wanted to write about.

Blogging – Contributed by Jaimie Bruzenak

Alice and I have joined the world of blogging. We have a blog: RV Home Yet? at http://rvhometown.typepad.com

My first experience with blogging was committing to write a blog on working on the RV road for Chuck Woodbury at RVTravel.com http://www.rvtravel.com/blog/rvwork/index.shtml I'm getting paid to write two posts/week on the topic. I'm up to 124 posts. We use Blogger, a free blogging software run by Google. Sign up for a Google email account and you can start a blog.

In November, Alice and I attended a conference in Scottsdale, AZ. One of the seminars was on blogging with Dave Barnhart of Blogging for Business http://www.bloggingforbusiness.com (link cannot be accessed). He did an excellent presentation on what blogging is and what an effective marketing tool blogging can be.

We had started a blog earlier in the summer. That is, I had started the blog. For me blogging is fun. Find an idea and write about it. Or take some photos of places you've stopped and blog about that. I like writing short pieces and ideas are endless. Alice seems to work better with deadlines so it hasn't quite caught on with her. So far, I do most of the posts.

To digress, a blog is short for "weblog" and is a structure that allows you to add an entry very easily. You write a short piece in a box for new posts. You can include photos and links using a simple tool bar. Click and it quickly uploads to the blogging site, where hopefully your loyal following reads your next post. Readers can subscribe to a blog so they are notified when a new post is available or even get each post through RSS feed. Some people are using blogs in place of a website, with each entry being a page. Blogs are perfect as travel journals and many RVers have started one so family and friends can keep up with travels. It is considered to be one of the new social media because it allows for an exchange between the poster and the reader. Readers can add comments to each post.

In addition to Blogger, Typepad and Wordpress are well known. Dave Barnhart recommends Typepad for business. The lowest fee is \$4.95/month or \$49.50/year. It is relatively easy to use and has a dozens of templates to choose from that look very professional. Wordpress, I'm told, is a bit more difficult. They do have a free version. With Dave's help, we switched to Typepad in December.

When you want to use a blog to get known and market a product, then the challenge is how do you get people to come to your blog? How do you get that conversation going?

I am signed up at Google Reader. You can input names (my own and Alice's) and phrases like "RV," "RV lifestyle" and it continually searches through blogs for posts that have that name

or phrase. When I check Google Reader, all my searches that have new entries are highlighted and I read quickly through them.

Now for the marketing part of Google Reader: When a topic catches my eye, I read the entire post and perhaps leave a comment. I leave my name and blog address. When someone comments and leaves a blog or website address in a comment on your blog, chances are you'll go look at it —if not the first time, maybe the next. Then you'll find a post of theirs to comment on. You start some conversations. Your name spreads on the Internet and you create a social network.

The neat thing about blogs is that they get picked up by search engines much more quickly than a change to a Web page. Dave was teaching a class once. One of the participants was blogging about the class and it appeared on the Google search engine before the class was finished. It's that fast.

Whether you want to blog your morning pages (see Julia Cameron's book *The Artist Way*), share your travels or use it to market your writing or a product, blogs are an easy and effective way to do that. The box you write your post in is small. I can write that much. In blogging short is probably better. So give it a try. Sign up for a free blogging account and get started. Several Penwheelers have blogs so check them out, leave a comment and make their day!

Blogging on the Web - Contributed by Kay Kennedy - It doesn't make sense not to at least try a blog for book promotion since it costs nothing but time.

The difference between a blog and a Website is that a Website stays more or less static while new messages should be posted on your blog on a regular basis to keep readers interested in coming back. You can promote your book project on either site, and can provide links to purchase the book from either a blog or a site.

Blogger (www.blogger.com) offers free blogs, and all you have to do is sign up, then find the layout you like and start posting. You can add your photo, your book's photo, links to related sites, and information about yourself or your book in a section that stays up permanently. Each post you add is displayed for awhile, although newer posts will be added above it, and eventually they will be pushed off that page. They'll still be available to readers in the archives. Posts should ideally be 300-600 words, but if you are providing information that requires more words, it is okay, although you might lose some readers who don't want to take time to read a long post.

I have four blogs currently up and running, two for each book that has been published in the past two years. One is for my newest book, Looking Back: Boomers Remember History from the '40s to the Present. That title was too long, especially for those searching the Internet, so one blog is: http://boomersrememberhistory.blogspot.com for those looking for books on the boomer era. The other blog for that book is: http://lookingbackboomersrememberhistory.blogspot.com for those who have heard of the book or read a review and are searching by the title. The book titled: Portable Writing: the secret to living your dreams with 25 projects to fund your freedom has one blog titled: http://portablewritingnewsletter.blogspot.com for those who know the title and know that I produce a regular newsletter. The other blog is

http://freelancewriter.booklocker.com for Internet users searching for books about freelance writing.

I believe that my blogs have definitely helped sell books. It's a way that those who don't know me can find out a little about my experience and writing skills. It is still necessary to publicize my blogs so that people know about them, and know where to look, so each email that goes out includes a signature line that has my name and the title of my blogs. That way, all of my regular correspondents know about them—and hopefully, help spread the word.

They usually have a few markets listed for free. If you join for a small fee, you can get into a larger list.

Writersweekly is a reputable newsletter that focuses on writers increasing their income, and it pays on assignment, so I've already received the check for the article. This is a good outlet for Penwheels members, but be sure to ask for writer's guidelines and study back issues/articles before you submit something.

3. ScriptFrenzy (April, 2008) – George Bruzenak

Get out your pens, warm up your computer, find a couple of ACCO #2 Brass brads* for your final manuscript, makes lots of coffee, buy lots of chocolate! Whatever it takes, join the rest of the crazies at http://www.scriptfrenzy.org/ for a month of creativity.

The folks who run the National Novel Writing Month (NaNoWriMo) have chosen the month of April as ScriptFrenzy month. Test your creativity by taking the plunge and join a world-wide community of script writers. You can work alone, or in teams of two. Here are the rules (really, this is all of them):

The 5 Basic Rules of Script Frenzy

- 1) To be crowned an official Script Frenzy winner, you must write a script (or multiple scripts) of at least 100 total pages and verify this tally on ScriptFrenzy.org.
- 2) You may write individually or in teams of two. Writer teams will have a 100-page total goal for their co-written script or scripts.
- 3) Script writing may begin no earlier than 12:00:01 AM on April 1 and must cease no later than 11:59:59 PM on April 30, local time.
- 4) You may write screenplays, stage plays, TV shows, short films, comic book scripts, adaptations of novels, or any other type of script your heart desires.
- 5) You must, at some point, have ridiculous amounts of fun. Simple, right? Check out http://www.scriptfrenzy.org/ for more information, forums and ideas. If you've never written a script before, this is a way to begin. There's lots of help for beginners and grizzled veterans alike.

ScriptFrenzy is run by the Office of Letters and Lights, and all donations are tax-deductible. There are no fees for joining the fun. Come on over and join us...it's a hoot!

*If your masterpiece is not printed on 3-hole paper bound with two ACCO #2 Brass brads, top and bottom, Hollywood agents won't even look at it. Don't ask me why.
