Preserving Your Memories - Contributed by Jaimie Hall Bruzenak, SKP# 19361

The Rim Country District of Arizona Press Women held a workshop on preserving your memories recently. Dee Dees, the morning speaker, is known as the "life story lady." She has helped many people record their life experiences and compile them into books to pass on to future generations. Her book, Write Your Life Story in 28 Days is a guide for compiling your own information (or that of a relative) and then putting it in book form. Most of the chapters are designed to help you trigger memories about various topics and milestones of your life. If you

follow the steps, you would have a good start on your own memoirs. Her book is available at Amazon for \$15.

The afternoon session featured Brenda Hamric of *Scrapbooks, Metal and More* - a shop in Payson - who showed us examples of altered books as a creative way to preserving memories. She demonstrated and then we practiced two techniques. Altered books are a fun way to preserve memories about a specific event or trip.

You take a hardback book at least two and one-half inches thick and add mementos, cut-outs, and other decorations to personalize and house your memories. It can be an individual or even a group project.

I didn't hear of any writing workshops in Quartzsite this year but I met several Penwheelers. **Judy Howard**, who wrote,





I feel like a professional author now. It is a funny feeling. For background, I just published my third novel, *Was a Time When*, to go with my first two about the 7.9 Scenario of a New Madrid earthquake, and now my author page looks impressive at Amazon.

About the "feel funny" comment: apart from the labor of doing background research, building a believable plot, and typing the words into my laptop, the rest of the work in writing a novel has become very smooth and easy. This time I did not fight the self-righteous emotions that I could write perfect English, or that I could simply leach off my friends and family for editing services. This time I hired a professional editor to do a comprehensive clean-up of the book.

I again used the services of CreateSpace.com (nee booksurge.com) to do the formatting and type-setting, but I supplied the cover. The only error there was I was told in no uncertain terms that the tag-line on the cover must match exactly with the tag-line on the inside title page. So both places now say A Novel That Asks, rather than saving some space on the cover.

I did learn a new skill, Kindle books. kdp.amazon.com lets you provide a book to put up as a Kindle file at no charge. You just have to have a clean book in .doc format with a good cover and follow their instructions. I actually did that for all three novels and have made over 50 sales during January. It was all amazingly easy.

I still need to get busy on the book marketing end of things, and I will be doing a "book tour" as a business reason for our travels this summer. > **Editing:** Too many people skimp on editing and it shows. The article on 3 types of editing would, in my opinion, be a good one for Penwheels

Editing your manuscript is a very important stage of the publishing process. This is especially true when you are self-publishing your own books or ebooks.

Yet many indie authors think that they can skip over editing completely and they publish books that are poorly written and filled with errors.

I have downloaded ebooks by dozens of indie authors who are guilty of this and it really is a shame. It is difficult enough trying to publish a bestselling book yet these authors are shooting themselves in the foot before their book launches. Some of the stories I have read are actually very good but through a lack of editing the authors let themselves down. How many readers refrained from leaving a good review because of the typos and errors? And how many readers have been driven (away from indie books) back to ebooks from traditional publishing houses because of poor experiences?

What is involved in editing? The amount of work involved in editing a manuscript depends upon the state of the manuscript and also on what type of editing you would like. Here are the three main types of editing:

<u>Critiquing</u>: this involves a critique of the manuscript to identify strengths and weaknesses. For fiction it includes an evaluation of character development, background setting, and plot resolution. A critique is usually done when you expect to rewrite your manuscript based on the feedback you receive.

<u>Substantive Language Editing</u>: this type of editing looks to correct a number of problems such as using the same words too many times and overusing adjectives or adverbs.

It includes sentence reconstruction and word replacement in addition to regular proofreading (as detailed below).

Proofreading: this type of editing is usually a check for grammar, spelling and punctuation mistakes.

Who Will Edit Your Book? Remember as a self-publisher you don't have to do everything yourself, and editing is definitely one of the tasks best left to somebody else.

- If you want to edit your own books then I recommend that you read "*Be Your Own Editor*" by Sigrid MacDonald.
