#### NaNoWriMo

For those of you who don't know what NaNoWriMo is: NaNoWriMo stands for the National Novel Writing Month. Beginning November first, you write 50,000 words (only 1,667/day). You are to write, not edit.

NaNoWriMo word count: 21,150 (Although I did not reach the 50,000 words needed to win NaNo, the challenge got my mind, pen, and keyboard moving again. It was the motivation I needed to get back to writing every day.)

I, too, started NaNoWriMo and then lost a few days. To date I have about 12500 words. I must get back at it.

The novel isn't much-I have two characters who are in search of a novel-and they interact with the writer.

I think I will finish 50,000 words by the end of the month.

#### Who Needs an Editor? By Patricia Fry

Do you need an editor? The fact is that more and more publishers require that their authors hire professional editors before submitting their manuscripts. Editing is also important when you go the self-publishing route. You want your book to outshine your competition.

How can you tell if you need an editor? Get an editorial evaluation. Some editors will evaluate your manuscript for free. Others may charge \$50 or \$100 to evaluate your first 25 or 40 pages.

Before turning your manuscript over to an editor, do a thorough self-editing. Here are some of the most common editing problems I encounter with my clients:

- Too many spaces between sentences. It is now one space after all punctuation.
- Dangling em dashes. The em dash now connects the two words—it no longer dangles between them.
- Improper use of the apostrophe.
- Improper use of quotation marks and single quotes.
- Errors that the spell check missed.
- Muddy writing.
- Redundancies.
- Incorrect use of common words. (Whose instead of who's, it's instead of its, for example.)
- Poorly organized story or nonfiction book.
- Inconsistencies in the material/story and/or spelling, capitalization, etc.

- Using the passive instead of the active writing.
- Inconsistent voice and tense.

The more errors you find while self-editing, the more you need an editor. If you don't find many or any errors, this could mean that you are simply not wired to see them. Hire an editor—or get an editorial evaluation.

### **Book Review Contributed by Jaimie Hall Bruzenak**

#### The Writer's Book of Hope: Getting from Frustration to Publication by Ralph Keyes

The Writer's Book of Hope is the follow-up book to Keyes' Courage to Write. He talks about how necessary hope is to writers, unpublished as well as award-winning and best-selling authors. He talks about how to deal with discouragers of all kinds, including yourself!

He then goes on to mention author after author who was rejected. Rejection is a rite of passage and can help you perfect your craft. Did you know the popular British mystery writer, John Creasey, collected 743 rejection slips before he sold his first book? He kept on writing and, over the next 40 years, published 562 full-length books under 28 different pseudonyms.

Keyes writes about how to move beyond frustration, to seek out encouragers and how to keep hope alive. And, publishing may not be necessary to find satisfaction in your writing. Keyes, for example, wrote a memoir that was not for publication but helped him put his life into perspective.

If you dream of publishing articles or a book, this book will be your encourager and help you to find more like-minded souls like our Penwheels group. I recommend it.
